<u>Thomas Olechowski</u>, Professor of Austrian and European Legal History at the University of Vienna, will present, "Kelsen and the Problem of Democratisation of the Administration." A wine and cheese reception will follow the event.

Abstract:

Hans Kelsen (1881-1973) was a professor in Vienna from 1918 to 1930 and at UC Berkeley from 1945 to 1952. He is well known as a legal theorist, but he also wrote on the theory of democracy and drafted the democratic constitution of Austria. The article shows, by way of an example, how much all three areas are interwoven and that Kelsen's influential theoretical ideas can only be understood against the background of legal history. Above all, it shows why Kelsen viewed the theory of the separation of powers with great skepticism and initially rejected it as undemocratic — and what later prompted him to change his mind.
